### Notes from the editor

The asterisk before a name indicates that the person's children are listed in the next Generation. The asterisk is hyperlinked to the children's' list. In some cases there are two asterisks indicating that the Mother was married twice and thus two sets of children with different surnames are listed. One may also click on the hyperlink of the "Children of..." to get back to that parent. Use your browser's search function to find specific individuals and other information. The copy used for this transcription had penciled notes in the margins and some newsprint clippings. These are included and are in italics.

The date and name formats are not proper for a genealogy but follow those of Dr. Harwood – too many errors likely in an extensive edit required to correct the formats. The dates are Month (written) Day, Year and all ancestors and their spouses names are in capitals. Unless otherwise noted, births are in the United States of America.

Making the portion of this document public that contains currently living persons is prohibited as the information may be used for identity theft. To assist in the protection of identities, the information of currently living persons beyond name is not included in published copies.

## Introduction to the First Edition

Eight years have elapsed since I began tracing the records of my Harwood ancestors and relatives, and I have now the pleasure of presenting to the descendents of my ancestor James Harwood, this brief sketch of our branch of the New England Harwoods.

When I first began tracing the records I had no thought of writing the family history. I was led to engage in the work simply from a desire to know more of my ancestry in the Harwood line. But as my interest in the work increased, I decided to publish the records in some form, so that the memory of our ancestors might be perpetuated, and we, their descendents, might come to know more of one another.

Being the first to write the history of our branch of Harwoods, I have had to collect most of the records from original sources, thus adding greatly to the labor of the undertaking. I wish here to acknowledge the kindness of those who have aided me with their letters or orally in tracing out these records. A list of those who have thus aided me will be found at the end of the book.

In arranging these records I have aimed to give the facts which I have collected in as plain and concise a manner as possible, and so arranged that the connection may be easily seen. With regard to this arrangement it will be noticed that all who have borne the name of HARWOOD are numbered, beginning with our common ancestor, JAMES, and carrying the order down through all the generations. An index will be found in the back part of the book giving the name and number of each Harwood whose name is enrolled in this work.<sup>1</sup>

I have taken particular care to get the names and dates correct and I think that all parts of the record may be relied upon as accurate.

In conclusion I would say that this has been a work requiring much labor and expense; and I hope it may meet the ends for which it is designed in giving us a better knowledge of our ancestors, and enabling us, their descendants, to become better acquainted with one another. Should this hope be realized, my labor will not have been in vain.

## Preface to the Second Edition

Twelve years ago I published in pamphlet form the results of my work up to that time in tracing the history and records of our branch of the New England Harwoods. I was then but a young man trying to make my way through school and college, with little time and means at my disposal for engaging in genealogical researches. But I loved the latter work, to me it was rest and recreation, and in such a spirit I followed it till the little book alluded to above was compiled and published.

Since then many experiences such as are common to this life have come to me, but none which has brought such pain as the loss of an only child, a bright, beautiful boy, who in the ten months God permitted him to stay with us, completely wove himself into my life and affections. In my loneliness since his death the thought has come to me that I would now take up the work I had all along intended sometime to do - complete and publish a second edition of the history of our family.

Ever since the first edition was published I have continued to collect material for a second and I think the records herein contained will be found as accurate and complete as it is now possible to make them. Nevertheless, it can hardly be expected that no errors will be made in writing such a work; it is even possible that there may be errors in the very arrangement of the early generations of the family. When we remember that there are several distinct branches of Harwoods in New England, as well as several in the Southern States, and that the ancestors of these different families immigrated from England to America at about the same time; when we further take into account that in almost every town where our forefathers dwelt there were also living families of the other branches of our name; and, when, with all this we take into consideration that the early town records, which were often but imperfectly kept, are now in many places lost, we cannot think it strange that such a work should be incomplete in spite of the most careful painstaking. All that the most faithful genealogist can do is to take the material now obtainable, study carefully each doubtful record, and give it the place to which it seems most probable to belong. This I have done, and in cases of uncertainty I have used the word "probably," or some word of similar import, to mark the uncertainty.

With these explanations and introductory remarks I now place again in the hands of my kinsmen, who share with me the honor of bearing the good, old, Saxon name of HARWOOD, this volume, confident that it will prove not only interesting, but will also serve to draw and bind the members of our family still closer together, scattered as they are from Maine to the far West.

## Progenitor

1. \* ANDREW HARWOOD was born in England. He came to Boston, MA, doubtless bringing his family with him, as we have no record of the births of his children in New England. The earliest record we have of him is that he was made freeman in Boston, MA, Feb. 28, 1643. In September, 1644, we find his name mentioned in the will of his son-in-law, Thomas Finson. This will reads as follows: "Whereas, Thomas Finson, mariner, late of Dartmouth, dyed aboard the shipp *Gilbert*, in September last, Oades Bayle being present, the said Thomas Finson by word of mouth declared this to be his last will and testament: To son Samuel fyve pounds of English money; to his child that his wife went withal fifty shillings; to his wife one Hogshead of Tobacco; to his father-in-law, Andrew Harwood, all his wages. The fifty shillings for the child and the Tobacco to be delivered to Andrew Harwood, for the use aforesaid." "Deposed the first of the 9th month, 1644, by Oades Bayle before the Court."

It may be well to note in the above will that Thomas Finson was "late of Dartmouth," as it may yet furnish us some clue to the English home of his wife's family. Dartmouth is a seaport town in the county of Devon, in the south-western part of England. It is well known that families descended from Hereward the Saxon have been settled in Devonshire for many centuries. Of course there is nothing beyond a suggestion in this, but it may possibly help lead to a more definite knowledge of the early English home of our ancestor, Andrew Harwood, and of the particular family of Hereward's descendants to which he belonged.

## Generation 2

### Children of ANDREW HARWOOD, No.1.

All born probably in London.

2. JAMES went from Boston to Springfield, MA, in 1649. Where he was made freeman. From 1654 to 1664, according to M. W. Harwood's researches, he was engaged in buying and selling land in the vicinity of Hartford, CN. Afterward he was settled at Stratford, CN.
3. JOHN There was a John Harwood, who was made freeman in Boston, MA, May 2, 1649, but as there were several others of the name in the vicinity of Boston at that time, it cannot now be determined whether this was the son of Andrew or not.
4. MRS. FINSON Nothing further is known of her than what is stated in her husband's will. There was an Ann Fisen who married JOSHUA ROGERS, at Boston, MA, Oct. 12, 1653. This may have been Thomas Finson's widow, as people were not at all particular how they spelled their names in those days.

## Generation 3

### Grandchildren of [Andrew Harwood](#), No. 1.

5. \* JAMES The earliest record we have of him seems to place him, then a young man, at Boston, MA. He entered the Colonial army in King Philip's war and served in Capt. Turner's company. On the 18th of May, 1676, occurred what has since been known as Falls Fight on the Connecticut River. Capt. Turner with his men surprised the Indians at a place of swift water, where they were engaged in fishing, and in the fight which followed, about 300 Indians were slain. At the close of the war, James Harwood settled in Chelmsford, MA, where he married LYDIA BARRETT, daughter of John and Sarah Barrett, Apr. 11, 1678. She was born in Chelmsford, Sep. 22, 1659. They continued to reside in Chelmsford, until about 1717, when they removed to Littleton, MA, where he died Aug. 1, 1719.
6. JOHN, married MARTHA BARTON, at Chelmsford, MA, Nov. 20, 1679. They were married by Samuel Adams, and the record says they were "both of Boston." I have no further record of them or of their descendants.

NOTE.-There were doubtless other children and grand-children of Andrew Harwood, No.1, but the records of them are lost.

## Generation 4

### Children of [James Harwood](#), No. 5.

7. ANDREW, born Sept. 2, 1692 in Chelmsford, MA.
8. ABIGAIL, born in Chelmsford, MA, twin sister to Andrew, died Sept. 1, 1695.
9. \* JAMES, born Sept. 80, 1695 in Chelmsford, MA. He removed with his father to Littleton, MA, in 1717. He married LYDIA -- and resided in Littleton, until 1727, when he sold his land in that town, and resided for a time in the vicinity of Concord, MA. In 1735, the General Court of Massachusetts acknowledged the importance of the perilous service rendered by the men engaged in Falls Fight, by granting a town-ship of land to the survivors of the fight and to the descendants of those who had died. This township, located at the place of the fight, was first called Fallstown, but is now Bernardston, MA. In the case of those who had died, the eldest son living was entitled to a portion of land. The lot in this family falling to James, he in May, 1737, drew lot No. 44, 1st division. (His residence at this time is given as at Concord, MA.) He did not, however, settle upon the land he had drawn, but continued to reside in or near Concord. The conditions of the grant above mentioned required that at least sixty families should settle in the new township within four years after the grant was made. Accordingly, in 1739, an effort was made to fill up the number. Some of the absent proprietors responded to the call; others, rather than go, chose to pay twenty-two pounds each, which went towards making improvements in the new town. Our ancestor was of the latter number. Soon after this he settled in Dunstable (now Nashua) NH. In 1747, we find his name in a list of those who voted against settling the Rev. Samuel Bird as pastor in Dunstable. Again, in 1754, we find his name attached to a petition for dividing the Province of New Hampshire into counties.
10. JOHN, born in Chelmsford, MA, twin brother of James, died in infancy.
11. ABIGAIL, born May 18, 1699 in Chelmsford, MA.
12. JOHN, born May 27, 1703 in Chelmsford, MA. He signed the deed with his brother James when they sold their land in Littleton, in 1727, and probably moved with him to Dunstable, NH. He was one of the signers of the petition in 1754, for dividing the Province of New Hampshire into counties.

## Generation 5

### Children of [James Harwood](#), No. 9.

13. ANDREW, born in Littleton, MA, July 5, 1722.
14. EUNICE, born in Littleton, March 21, 1724
15. MARY, born in Littleton, June 6, 1726.
16. \* JAMES, born about the year 1728. His birth occurred after the family left Littleton. He was one of the signers of the petition in 1754, for dividing the Province of New Hampshire into counties. His name appears on this paper as "James Harwood, Jr." He was from early manhood until the close of his eventful life almost constantly engaged as a soldier in the service of his country. Sept. 22, 1755, he enlisted in Capt. James Todd's Co., Col. Peter Gilman's Reg't, to serve in the war against the French and Indians. The next mention I find of him is in Fox's "History at Dunstable," which gives the names of James and John Harwood as belonging to the company of Roger's Rangers. They were sent out from Dunstable in 1759, and were at the storming of Quebec, Canada, under Gen. Wolfe.

Next we find that James Harwood enlisted March 18, 1760 in Capt. Nehemiah Lovewell's Co., Col. James Goffe's Reg't, to serve until the following November. Thus his service in the old French and Indian war covered a period of five years. The beginning of the Revolutionary contest found him as ready to risk his life in the cause of the American Colonies as he had been to fight the battles of the Mother Country. He enlisted in Capt. Wm. Walker's company, Col. James Reed's Reg't. Capt. Walker's company is said to have comprised one-half the able bodied men of Dunstable. They were among the first men sent out from New Hampshire to engage in the struggle for American Independence. They were present and fought bravely at the battle of Bunker Hill.

According to a tradition in our family which was related to me many years ago by Simeon C. Harwood (No. 33), James Harwood went to Canada with the army under the command of Gen. Arnold late in the autumn of 1775. If this tradition be reliable, our ancestor was one of that heroic band who accompanied Arnold through the wilderness of Maine, experiencing untold hardship and suffering on the way. Arrived at Quebec, Arnold with his men climbed to the Plains of Abraham, as Wolfe with his soldiers had done sixteen years before, and offered battle. But the British, secure within their fortifications, did not come out to meet them. Arnold then fell back and awaited the approach of Gen. Montgomery. When the latter arrived he assumed command of the whole force and besieged the town. It was on the last day of December, 1775, that the Americans made an assault on the citadel. Gen. Montgomery was killed; Arnold was wounded. The Americans retired to a point three miles above the city. Here the small pox broke out in their camp and here, if the tradition related to me by S. C. Harwood is correct, our ancestor James Harwood died of the disease. The History of Dunstable, however, written by Charles J. Fox, (1846) and other New Hampshire records, give the date of James Harwood's death as December, 1777, in the army. Of course records are more to be relied upon than tradition. In this case it matters little, for both agree in stating



that our ancestor died in the Revolutionary Army. His was a life of patriotic service, a life of which his descendants to the latest generation may well be proud.

Of James Harwood's wife I have been able to gather the following facts: Her maiden name was CLOGSON, and she belonged to one of the Scotch-Irish Presbyterian families that immigrated from the North of Ireland and settled Londonderry, NH, 1718-1725. She was born a few years after the family came to this country, and lived to the advanced age of 99 years. The Clogstons have been a very respectable family in New Hampshire. Some of this family settled in Goffstown, NH, about 1765, and their descendants are numerous at the present time.

**Children of [John Harwood](#), No. 12.**

17. JOHN, probably a son of John, No. 12, resided in Dunstable, NH. He served as a soldier in the old French and Indian war. He enlisted in Col. Blanchard's Regiment, Aug. 23, 1754, for three months. Again he enlisted in the same regiment, April 24, 1755, to serve till October following. He is also recorded in Fox's "History" as being with James, No. 16, in the company of Roger's Rangers at the storming of Quebec, in 1759. It is supposed that this John Harwood was the same who married ABIGAIL HASTINGS, of Amherst, NH, and settled in Mount Vernon, NH He died about 1812.
18. JAMES, probably a son of John, No. 12, resided in Dunstable. He served in the Revolutionary war, and was killed at Hubbardton, VT on the retreat of the army from Ticonderoga, NY, July 7, 1777.

## Generation 6

### Children of [James Harwood](#), No. 16.

19. \* JOHN, born in Dunstable, MA about the year 1755. He served in the Revolutionary war, was wounded, and during the latter part of his life received a pension from the U. S. Government. He married SALLY MARTIN of Hooksett, and they settled on a farm near Manchester, NH. In 1820 he sold his farm and lived the rest of his life in Manchester. He died in 1832 or 1833, and was buried in the Valley Cemetery at Manchester. His wife died in 1830.
20. \* JAMES, born in 1760 in Dunstable, MA. He married PATTY SANDERS, and settled in Unity, NH. In the spring of 1800, while at work cutting ice out of the flume of a saw mill, the ice gave way, and he was carried over the dam and killed almost instantly. His wife was born in 1759, and died in 1839. She was a Congregationalist.
21. \* ARCHIBALD, born Aug., 1762 in Dunstable, MA. He entered the American Army in the war of Revolution in 1778, when only 16 years of age, as a substitute for another man. He was one of those who were sold to the British by the traitor Arnold. He used often to relate to his children how Washington addressed the soldiers after Arnold's treachery became known. After the war Archibald went to Springfield, VT, where he married SUSANNAH BOURE, May 8, 1786. She was born in February, 1762 probably in Plymouth Co., MA, and was a daughter of Coombs and Prudence House. Coombs House was descended in a direct line from Samuel House who came from England and settled in Scituate, Plymouth Co., MA, in 1634.

The mother of Coombs House was a daughter of Anthony Coombs, a French Protestant, born in France in 1656, and came to America in 1675. He settled in Plymouth County, MA, and afterwards, it is said lived in Newburyport, MA. Coombs House purchased land in Springfield, VT, Aug, 18, 1773, and continued to reside in that town until his death some twenty years later. In Feb., 1794, Archibald and Susannah Harwood, then of Weathersfield, VT, conveyed to others their interest in the Coombs House estate. In March, 1794, David House conveyed his share of his father's estate to his sister, Susannah Harwood. In May, 1805, Archibald and Susannah Harwood "quit-claimed their interest in the real estate of Coombs House, late of Springfield, deceased, now belonging to Prudence House, widow of Coombs," to Eleazer Sartwell.

Archibald purchased 10 acres of land in Weathersfield in 1792; 30 acres in 1796; 25 acres in 1799; and sold all three pieces to Luke Nichols, of Weathersfield, Oct. 4, 1800. He was by trade a carpenter and millwright. He removed to Eden, VT, in 1802, and built the first mills ever erected in that town. In March, 1802, he was elected treasurer and constable in the town of Eden. In 1804 he was elected lister. In 1806 he was again elected constable. The town records of deeds show several transfers of real estate made by and to Mr. Harwood in Eden, from Oct. 10, 1802, until April 6, 1814. He was an active, enterprising, business man. He removed from Eden to Constable, Franklin Co., NY, and there built and owned mills. He died

in Eden in 1837. His wife in 1848. She was a professing Christian, and a very excellent woman.

22. ROSANNAH, born in Dunstable, MA, married JOHN BURLINGAME. They resided in Weathersfield, VT, where **several children were born to them**. In 1807 Mr. B. purchased property in Eden, VT, from his brother-in-law, Archibald Harwood.
23. LYDIA, born in Dunstable, MA, married JONATHAN ORDWAY and **they had three children**. Her second husband was JEDEDIAH HUTCHINS, and **they had two sons and two daughters**. One of these daughters married Nathan Hobbs, and became the mother of Hon. Albert Hobbs, of Malone, NY.

## Generation 7

### Children of [John Harwood](#), No. 19.

24. \* DANIEL, born in Manchester, NH, married SUSAN STEVENS. They resided in Goffstown, NH, occupying one house for 60 years.
25. JOHN, born in Manchester, NH, settled in South Carolina.
26. \* POLLY, born June 16, 1789 in Manchester, NH. She married JESSIE BAKER, and lived in Manchester, NH. He died Jan. 19, 1844, and she March 23, 1870.
27. SALLY, born in Manchester, NH, married MARK WEBSTER, of Salem, She died in 1836.
28. WILLIAM PARKER, born in Manchester, NH, married SALLY GORHAM, of Dennis, MA. They resided at Barnstable, MA. He sold dry goods for several years, and afterwards became a contractor, building bridges, wharves, etc. on Cape Cod Peninsula. He died at Hudson, NH, in 1874. They had no children.
29. \* DAVID, born Jan., 1804 in Manchester, NH. He married LYDIA ROGERS, of Harwich, MA, in 1847. He was a shoe maker and farmer. He died Sept. 18, 1879.

### Children of [James Harwood](#), No. 20.

30. PATTY, born Oct. 28, 1788. She resided in Lynn, MA, where she died May, 1851.
31. \* JAMES, born Dec. 28, 1789. He married HANNAH WEBSTER, of Unity, NH, Feb. 25, 1809. They removed to Eden, VT, where they resided two years, then returned to New Hampshire. In 1824 they settled in Wilton, ME, where he was engaged in farming. He died Jan. 12, 1851, and his wife Mar. 15, 1874.
32. \* ARCHIBALD, born April 16, 1791, in Unity, NH. He served in the war of 1812 as a teamster. He married PHEBE WELLS, of Peru, NY, and lived there for a time; then returned to Unity, and finally settled in Claremont, NH, where he was a farmer. He died September 29, 1868, and his wife Dec. 18, 1866.
33. \* SIMEON C., born July 4, 1794, in Unity, NH. He married PARILLA LEAVITT, Sept. 1, 1816. She was born at Rupert, VT, May 22, 1799. They settled in Dickinson, Franklin County, NY, in 1820, where he was a farmer many years. He was also a postmaster in Dickinson, and a justice of the peace. They finally removed to. Moira, NY, where he died Aug. 8, 1883, and his wife Sept. 12, 1872. They were both members of the Congregational Church.
34. \* DAVID, born in 1797 at Unity. He married Mrs. PHILENA ORCUTT, Aug. 15, 1829. They resided in Lynn, MA, where he died May 3, 1843. His wife died Dec. 5, 1845.
35. \* POLLY, born in Unity. She married Deacon JOHN WORTHLEY, and resided in Antrim, NH.

### Children of [Archibald Harwood](#), No. 21.

36. \* JESSE, born Oct. 15, 1786, at Springfield, VT. He married SALLY SCOFIELD, at Eden, VT, about 1806. She was born in Stamford, Conn., in 1788. They settled at

Hadley, Saratoga County, NY, where he died Oct. 18, 1824. His wife died at Floyd, IA, Feb. 7, 1868. She was a member of the Congregational Church.

37. \* SARAH, born at Weathersfield, VT, Feb. 5, 1789. She married CHARLES WHITTEMORE, in 1808. We learn from the town records of Eden that Archibald Harwood and N. P. Sawyer sold real estate in Eden to Chas. Whittemore, June 13, 1803. Mr. and Mrs. Whittemore made their home in Eden, where she died April 23, 1870.
38. \* ANNIS, born April 5, 1791, in Weathersfield, VT. She married CLARK ELY. They resided in Eden, VT, where she died in 1868.
39. \* CYRUS, born in 1793, in Weathersfield, VT. Married MARY LEE, about 1823. He studied law and was admitted to the bar at Sandy Hill, NY. He afterward, about 1830, removed to Ridgeway, NY, where he practiced his profession and became quite eminent therein. He removed in 1836 to Michigan, where he soon after died.
40. \* HEMAN, born December 19, 1794, in Weathersfield, VT. He served in the American army in the war of 1812, and many years after his widow; received from the government, on account of such service, a piece of Western land. He married MARY STOWELL, daughter of David Stowell, at Eden, VT, about 1818. She was born in Winchester, NH, Dec. 3, 1794. The town records of Eden tell us that Heman Harwood bought land from Oliver Pratt, March 19, 1818, and again Feb. 19, 1822. He transferred real estate to Oliver Pratt, March 19, 1818 and Feb. 12, 1824, he sold all of his property in Eden to J. D. & J. Hutchins. He then moved with his family to Bangor, Franklin County, N. Y., where he engaged in farming. In Oct., 1834, he went to Niagara, Ont.; to work, and in Aug., 1835, he wrote his wife that he had been ill and was coming home. That was the last his family ever heard of him, and it is supposed that he was either murdered for his money, of which he had a considerable sum, or drowned while on the way home. His widow, left with seven young children to care for, proved equal to the task, and succeeded in keeping them altogether till they were grown to manhood and womanhood. She was a member of the Methodist Church. She died in Todd County, Minn., Feb. 13, 1874.
41. \* LUKE, born April 6, 1797, in Weathersfield, VT. He married LUCINDA LEAVITT, a sister to his cousin Simeon's wife, in 1820. She was born Aug. 30, 1796. They resided in Franklin Co., N. Y., until 1832, when they removed to Wayne County MI, and from there to Ionia Co., MI, where he died Apr. 16, 1863. His wife died Sept. 26, 1870 of *consumption in Berlin, IA*. She was a Presbyterian.
42. AMANDA, born in 1799, in Weathersfield, VT. She married ROYAL CHAMBERLAIN, and they had children.
43. \* JAMES, born Jan. 13, 1801, in Weathersfield, VT. He married ARVILLA SARTWELL at Eden, VT. He was one of the pioneer settlers of Allen Co., IN, settling in the town of Perry, as early as 1836. Some fourteen years later he took a trip to the far West, working at his trade of carpenter; and it is supposed he was murdered by the Mormons near Salt Lake City, UT. His wife died July 22, 1893. She was a Methodist.
44. \* PHILA, born July 8, 1803, in Eden, VT. She married REUBEN ADAMS, Dec. 12,

1822. They resided many years in Crete, Ill. where he died Nov. 23, 1886, and she Feb. 26, 1890.

When he was but twelve years of age, it fell to his lot, as the eldest son, to assist his widowed mother in caring for the younger children, and this duty he performed far more faithfully than many older persons would have done. In early life he professed faith in Christ, and became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. For forty years he served the Church as class leader. He was loyal to the Church, active and cheerful in her support, constant in his attendance on her services. In 1889, he suffered a severe attack of la grippe, which left him with pulmonary disease. He steadily grew worse until after a year of great suffering death came to his relief, Dec. 23, 1890. Mr. Harwood in the management of his farm and other business was energetic and exceedingly methodical. Of him it might emphatically be said, "He had a place for everything and everything in its place." His wife still resides on the old homestead in Bangor, where they began their married life in 1851. Like him she has been an earnest, consistent Christian from childhood.
116. OLIVER, born July 21, 1824, in Bangor, NY, where also the rest of the family was born. He died July 8, 1825.
117. \* OLIVER, born Feb. 6, 1826, in Bangor, NY. He married ELIZABETH STEENBEHG, Sept. 24, 1850. They removed to Wisconsin, in 1855. He served in the Union army, enlisting Feb. 10, 1862, in Co. I., 5th Regt. Wisconsin Infantry. He joined his command while it was a part of King's Brigade, and was soon after transferred to that of Gen. Hancock, which in March started for Manassas, but the action there being at an end, returned to Alexandria, and made connection with the forces of McClellan for the Peninsular Campaign. He was in the attack at Lee's Mills, on the Warwick River, and next in the battle of Williamsburg, and then was in the following named battles with his regiment: Fredericksburg, Yorktown, Rappahannock Station, Mine Run, Antietam, and Gettysburg.

In the first day's fight in the battle of the Wilderness, he was taken prisoner, May 5, 1864. He had previously veteranized and taken a furlough, but on the day mentioned was one of a detail to guard a train. He was stationed on the extreme left of the skirmish line, when they were attacked by a rebel brigade. He was several rods from his comrades, and being captured he informed the rebels that a strong force of troops were lying a little back from the stream. Believing him, they

did not advance, and by this ruse he saved the wagon train, which would otherwise have fallen into their hands.

He was then taken to Orange Court House, where he was relieved of the most of his personal possessions, and then he was removed successively to Gordonsville, Lynchburg, and Danville. From the latter place was taken to Andersonville, May 23. Here he remained four months, when he was removed to the prison at Florence, S. C. Late in the following February, Mr. Harwood with a vast throng of ragged, starving, shivering, hatless, bare-footed, emaciated, filthy, vermin-covered, and altogether forlorn wretches, were marched to Wilmington to be exchanged. It is safe to conjecture that such another procession will never again traverse the soil of this united country. Every rod of their progress was marked with unparalleled suffering; gaunt, grim, haggard, every line of every face marked with the ravages of a privation too miserable to be depicted with pen or brush; every form crippled and stooping under a burden of endurance too bitter even to recall with patience. Think of this picture, sons and beneficiaries of those who made this weary journey, and try to realize their emotions as they passed into redemption under the stars and stripes, in March 1865. Mr. Harwood's health was shattered in a terrible manner. He had the scurvy so badly that all his teeth fell out, and he has never since seen a well day. The hardships to which he was exposed at Florence were much less than those at Andersonville, but he suffered greatly from cold at Florence.

During the winter season, Mr. H. states that many men died from lack of ambition and energy sufficient to move about and take care of themselves. He was the first man who did shoemaking in Andersonville prison. For a hammer he had an iron nut or burr, on which he put a stick for a handle, and he made lasts of pieces of board. He had previously done some cobbling, but had not learned the trade. He picked up old shoes which he repaired, and made new ones. For thread he had the raveling of a piece of English tent cloth, and he obtained needles which he made flexible by heating. For pegs he took the heart of a pine stump and made them one at a time, with a case knife. He had come to the conclusion that he could never get out of prison, and determined to make the best of it; and he went to work in order to be employed and to earn something to keep himself alive. He was for sometime the only shoemaker in the stockade, rising early in the morning, and working late at night by the light of pine knots. The money he earned he used in relieving the necessities of himself and companions. After awhile, others began to make shoes, and it became quite a business. His pegging awl and case knife which he brought from Wisconsin, he managed to secrete when taken prisoner and he carried them from Andersonville to Florence, where he carried on the same business also. He had a razor which he carried all the way through and with which he shaved his fellow prisoners. At Andersonville, he gave two cents a spoonful for salt, and only drew salt rations twice. He gave a greenback dollar for a pound of salt that had just been taken from a pork barrel.

Sometimes the men, who went out to gather wood, would be allowed to bring in an extra stick for their own use, and they sometimes bought beans and other food from the citizens, and smuggled them into the prison. A common method was to split a

log, make it hollow place the provisions inside and fasten it together with wedges. This was after awhile discovered by the prison-keepers. At Wilmington, Mr. Harwood was paroled and went to Annapolis, where he came near burning to death in a tent which took fire. There he received a furlough and returned to Wisconsin. The war closed before his leave of absence expired, and he did not rejoin his command.

Since the war he has lived in Waushara Co., WI, in the vicinity of Plainfield. He married, Aug. 25, 1867, for a second wife, Mrs. LUCY E. CUMMINGS. He was formerly a member of the Methodist Church, but now with his wife belongs to the Baptist Church of Plainfield. He has been a Justice of the Peace. Is a member of the G.A.R. organization?

LYMAN, the eldest son, then arose and made these remarks: " Dear parents, On my own behalf and by the request of these, my brothers and sisters, we desire to tender you our sincere thanks for this another manifestation of your love for us your children. We congratulate you on your success in the past, and thank you for the many lessons of advice and instruction you have given us. We know that by following your examples we may be true men and women. We hope you may both yet be spared many years and that your advice may be a blessing to us in the future, as it has in the past. We hope to live to have many more of these family reunions which we all so much enjoy."

The father then rose and replied as follows: "Dear children, this has been a very pleasant meeting to us, and we unite our wishes with yours for many more such reunions. To see our children gathered together at their home is the greatest

pleasure your mother and I ever expect to enjoy here upon earth. It has been the aim of our lives to set such examples before our children that they might grow up respected and useful. We feel to thank you each and every one for the cheerfulness with which you have received our instructions, and wherever we may have erred, we hope you may, as you see the errors, avoid them, and set examples before your children worthy of imitation. Children, your parents have now passed the meridian of life and must soon be separated from you. It is our aim to make Heaven our home, and we hope we may all so live that we may be gathered an unbroken family in the better world.” Isaac Harwood died Nov. 3, 1894.

Mr. Harwood is a member of the Boston Shoe and Leather Exchange,



and a director of the Lynn National Bank and Lynn Safe Deposit and Trust Co. In fraternal circles he is a 32nd degree Mason, is connected with the Odd Fellows, and also with a local lodge of the Knights of Honor. He is a member of both the Oxford and Park Clubs, and is serving his third year as president of the Lynn Republican Club. His election to the mayoralty in December, 1893, by a plurality of 2,698 votes, the largest ever given a mayor in Lynn, was no mean compliment, and that too with five opposition candidates. He had previously served in the Common Council two years, and been a member of the Board of Aldermen one year. His administration as mayor during 1894 was eminently satisfactory to the people of the city. This was shown by his selection for a second term and his re-election by a large and flattering majority, thus proving the confidence the citizens of Lynn repose in him.
